Parish Stewardship Committee Members

The make-up and selection of the committee members is crucial to a parish's stewardship effort. After initial planning by the pastor, staff members and leadership councils – a list should be compiled of individuals who have a strong commitment to prayer and to the practice of stewardship. The committee must be a working group and prospects should have the qualities of perseverance, leadership and organizational ability. While the pastor is often the best person to identify potential members, **his personal call or visit is clearly the most effective method of recruitment**.

Along with the pastor, a staff member and representatives of the Pastoral and Finance Councils, membership should include those experienced in leadership, communication, faith formation and technology. Members should commit to a two-year or three-year term, minimum.

The overall purpose of a Stewardship Committee is to be responsible for planning and coordinating the education, communication and implementation of stewardship activities. These activities - which should be aligned with the Parish Pastoral Plan – include but are not limited to:

- 1. Personal study and reflection on stewardship
- 2. Collaboration with others to present stewardship prayerfully and appropriately
- 3. Prepare/distribute information that furthers the parish's experience of stewardship
- 4. Implement a regular process for parishioner commitment of time, talent and treasure
- 5. Ensure that accurate records of parishioner involvement and commitment are maintained
- 6. Work with ministry leaders to ensure that all who volunteer are contacted on a timely basis
- 7. Report to the parish the results of the stewardship education and commitment efforts
- 8. Ensure that one's stewardship of time, talent and treasure are acknowledged appropriately
- 9. Evaluate your activities and processes on a regular basis
- 10. Seek and train new committee members plan for succession
