- RE: Clarifications: Response to the COVID-19 Pandemic in the Diocese of Honolulu (March 16, 2020)

This MEMO is to provide some clarification and additional information to the MEMORANDUM "Response to the COVID-19 Pandemic in the Diocese of Honolulu" from Bishop Larry Silva dated Monday, March 16, 2020.

- RCIA (celebrations of the rites for the Elect):
  - Presentation of the Creed and the Our Father (Third & Fifth Week of Lent)
    RCIA paragraph #104-105, <u>the presentations are optional</u>; however, for pastoral reasons, the presentation of the Our Father may be celebrated on Holy Saturday (see RCIA #185) with the Ephphetha Rite.
  - Second and Third Scrutiny (Fourth and Fifth Sunday of Lent) During normal times ALL three scrutinies are required. However, RCIA paragraph #20 reads: "The scrutinies... the bishop may dispense from one of them for serious reasons or, <u>in extraordinary circumstances, even</u> <u>from two</u>." Since Masses are canceled in our diocese for the next two weekends, Bishop Silva is granting a dispensation from the celebrations of the Second and Third Scrutinies. However, in the case our Mass cancelations are extended through the Triduum / Easter Vigil time, we will have directives on how to celebrate the rites on a later day.
- <u>Homebound ministry:</u> It recommended that this ministry be suspended at this time for all except priests. Priests are to attend to the needs of those who ask for the Anointing of the Sick or the Viaticum. If a priest is sick or considered to be a high-risk individual (e.g. frail elderly, suffers from respiratory conditions, immunocompromised, etc.), he should request assistance from another priest. Priests attending to the needs of the sick are to observe all proper sanitary protocols and, if necessary, check-in with proper medical personnel before entering the room of the patient. For the time being, sick calls and distribution of Holy Communion should be reserved to priests only. Priests are to take care that their oil stocks are not contaminated in any way.

- <u>Holy Communion outside of Mass</u>: Individual Communion upon request should not be granted, unless the person is near or in danger of death.
- **Livestreaming:** Parishes are invited to inform their parishioners of opportunities • to view the Mass via livestream. The weekday and Sunday Mass will be livestreamed from various churches in our diocese. A list of churches that are providing livestreaming would be available on our website at www.catholichawaii.org/covid19. The United States Conference of Catholic Bishops (USCCB), the Confraternity of Christian Doctrine (CCD), and the International Commission on English in the Liturgy (ICEL) are waiving any need to request permission to use readings or Mass prayers in a livestreamed liturgy. Also streaming permission is granted to include OCP music in any recorded services through April 15. OCP asks that you post the copyright lines for any OCP songs included in the streamed celebrations on the website which streams the service. - <u>Church signs</u>: We suggest that parishes post signs at the church doors with information about the importance of maintaining "social distance" when engaging in private prayer inside the church. See below for sample signage.

#### **SPIRITUAL COMMUNION**

What is spiritual communion? St. Thomas Aquinas described it as "an ardent desire to receive Jesus in the most holy sacrament and lovingly embrace him" at a time or in circumstances when we cannot receive him in sacramental Communion. With the absence of public Masses in the Diocese of Honolulu, the opportunity for receiving spiritual communion is particularly appropriate.

Spiritual communion needs no special instruction; it only requires the same disposition as the actual reception of the sacrament and a turning to Jesus with the heart. No particular prayer or formulary is required; however, to help focus a proper intention, recitiation of a prayer is suggested. One of the most popular is that composed by St. Alphonsus Liguori:

My Jesus, I believe that you are present in the Blessed Sacrament. I love you above all things and I desire you with all my heart. Since I cannot now receive you sacramentally, I ask you to come spiritually into my heart. I embrace you as if you were already in my heart and unite myself to you completely. Please do not let me ever be separated from you.
